

Cost of Living Index

Third Quarter 2016

The Council for Community and Economic Research (C2ER) released its third quarter 2016 Cost of Living Index for 261 urban areas. The Cost of Living Index measures regional differences in the cost of consumer goods and services, excluding taxes and non-consumer expenditures, for professional and managerial households in the top income quintile. It is based on more than 90,000 prices covering 60 different items that are priced each quarter. Small differences should not be interpreted as showing a measurable difference. It should be noted that the Cost of Living Index does not measure inflation, which is the price change over time. Accordingly, since each quarterly data represent a distinct comparison of prices at a single point in time and both the number and the mix of Cost of Living Index participants change overtime, index data from different quarters cannot be compared.

The table below shows the most and least expensive urban areas that participated in the pricing event for the third quarter of 2016.

Wichita's Cost of Living Index in the third quarter of 2016 was 90.7; nearly 9 percent below the national average. In previous years, Wichita's Cost of Living Index was 94.2 in the third quarter of 2015 and 94.1 in the third quarter of 2006.

Compared to other indicated surrounding metro areas in the above table, Wichita was the fifth most affordable metro area to live in. In the third quarter of 2016, with a Cost of Living Index of 83.0 Oklahoma City, OK was the most affordable among indicated areas; whereas, Denver, CO was the most expensive with a Cost of Living Index of 112.6.

The composite index is based on six component categories – housing, utilities, grocery items, transportation, health care, and miscellaneous goods and services. When analyzing the most current price data, C2ER identified the five most and least expensive urban areas for purchasing groceries. The grocery item index number used to determine those areas is based on 26 items from a variety of surrogate categories used to represent the grocery item component of the composite index.

The grocery index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 93.2; 6.8 percent below the national average. The grocery index number for Wichita was 94.2 in the third quarter of 2015 and 94.1 in the third quarter of 2006.

As indicated in the above table, compared to other component categories in Wichita in the third quarter of 2016, the grocery index was one of the lowest indices; whereas, transportation and utilities were the highest.

The housing index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 68.5; 31.5 percent below the national average. The housing index number for Wichita was 74.1 in the third quarter of 2015 and 86.2 in the third quarter of 2006.

The health care index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 97.5; 2.5 percent below the national average. The health care index number for Wichita was 97.0 in the third quarter of 2015 and 94.0 in the third quarter of 2006.

The miscellaneous goods and services index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 97.9; 2.1 percent below the national average. The miscellaneous goods and services index number for Wichita was 104.0 in the third quarter of 2015 and 101.1 in the third quarter of 2006.

The transportation index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 104.5; 4.5 percent above the national average. The transportation index number for Wichita was 99.1 in the third quarter of 2015 and 100.4 in the third quarter of 2006.

The utilities index number for Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was 107.5; 7.5 percent above the national average. The utilities index number for Wichita was 116.0 in the third quarter of 2015 and 96.6 in the third quarter of 2006.

In recent months, the price of eggs significantly dropped in some areas of the country. C2ER decided to identify the five most and least expensive cities to buy a dozen large Grade-A eggs in the U.S.

The price of one dozen eggs in Wichita in the third quarter of 2016 was \$1.22; 0.38 cents below the national average. The price of one dozen eggs in Wichita was \$2.69 in the third quarter of 2015 and \$1.02 in the third quarter of 2006.
