

Cost of Living Housing Index

2017 Annual Average

The Cost of Living Index, from The Council for Community and Economic Research (C2ER), measures regional differences in the cost of consumer goods and services, excluding taxes and non-consumer expenditures, for professional and managerial households in the top income quintile. This index includes more than 90,000 prices covering 60 different items collected each quarter. The index measures the relative price levels in participating areas. The average for all participating places equals 100, and each area's index is a percentage of the average for all areas.

One of the index components measures the relative price of housing between areas. The majority of the areas included in the index, 74 percent, had housing prices below the national average in 2017. The 26 percent of cities with a higher cost of living were primarily located on the coasts, or in Alaska or Hawaii. The three Kansas metropolitan areas included in the index averaged 27.4 percent below the national average when weighted by population.

The ten most expensive urban areas were all located in New York, California, Hawaii, and Virginia, they were on average 193.7 percentage points above the national average. The ten least expensive urban areas were on average 37.3 percentage points below the national average. These areas were spread throughout the south and Midwest.

Within the five-state region surrounding Kansas, the price of housing was generally below the national average. Denver, CO and Colorado Springs, CO were the only metropolitan areas in the region with a cost of housing above the national average. Kansas had a population weighted average housing cost 27.4 percentage points below the national average in 2017.
